entucky Agriculture. These are two words that bring to mind history, innovation, hard work, and business opportunities throughout the Commonwealth. Agriculture continues to be the backbone of Kentucky's economy with new opportunities and challenges around every corner.

Opportunities and challenges were addressed in the comprehensive Strategic Plan for Kentucky agriculture. The plan was created by the Task Force on the Future of Agriculture and more than 50 agricultural organizations worked together for nearly a year developing long range and short term goals for agriculture across the state. In January 2008, Governor Steve Beshear accepted the plan demonstrating his support for our agricultural industry. This plan coupled with the culmination of an evaluation of investment in our state's agriculture economy from the Kentucky Agriculture Development Fund (KADF), positions Kentucky's oldest industry to continue its growth and future development for our farmers and rural communities.

The results of the KADF program evaluation commissioned by the Kentucky Agricultural Development Board, validated the \$209 million of investments from 2001-2006, justifying its continued support. The evaluation conducted by the University of Kentucky confirmed that the Commonwealth benefited from the non-model project investments with a return on investment of almost 2:1. Additionally the county model program investments of approximately \$100 million leveraged, at a minimum, an additional \$100 million of investments by farmers. The KADF investments made in the past and future will be the foundation for new opportunities.

This past March, Kentucky Agricultural Development Board Chairman Governor Beshear demonstrated his leadership and support for agriculture by unveiling the Kentucky Agricultural Relief Effort, a statewide program designed to lessen the impact of the 2007 adverse weather conditions on farm families. It allocated \$8.15 million for farmers, with emphasis given to projects that not only are helping farmers currently but will also help them five or ten years down the road in coping with weather-related disasters. Not only did 118 out of 120 counties eligible take part, but several counties committed additional County Agricultural Development Funds towards this initiative for a total exceeding \$11 million.

In June, First Lady Jane Beshear held a farmers' market on the Capitol Grounds and Governor Beshear hosted a ceremonial signing for House Bill 626. This legislation established the Kentucky Proud brand as the permanent marketing program for the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, which is made possible through Kentucky Agricultural Development Funds. This is part of Governor and Mrs. Beshear's initiative to increase the focus on agricultural development, marketing and promotion of Kentucky products.

The Governor's Office of Agricultural Policy, the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, state law makers and others working together to improve net farm income is the key to the success of our agricultural industry. On behalf of farm families and Kentucky's rural communities we thank Governor Beshear for his continued commitment to ensuring 50 percent of the Master Settlement Agreement Funds be invested each year into agriculture.

# Long-term Plan Priorities

entucky's historic investment in agricultural diversification created an unprecedented opportunity for Kentucky farmers to access funds for agricultural diversification and the expansion of farm based enterprises.

To provide a guide for this investment, Kentucky's agricultural community came together and created a long-term plan. In January 2002, the Kentucky Agricultural Development Board (KADB) approved Kentucky's first long-term plan for agricultural development, *Cultivating Rural Prosperity*. This plan is the blueprint for Kentuckians in addressing issues associated with agricultural growth and diversification in the Commonwealth as we begin the difficult task of changing an industry that is dependent upon tobacco.

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board focused this fiscal year on the following six priorities as they continued their commitment to funding agricultural diversification throughout the Commonwealth.

# Priority #1

# **Marketing and Market Development**

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board has worked extensively with producers and commodity groups toward the development of the infrastructure for Kentucky agriculture.

Investments in this area range from local farmers' markets to largescale value-added processing. All of which are important in creating a comprehensive local, regional, and state marketing system for Kentucky farm products.

# Improving Access to Capital

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board recognizes that, while capital sources are generally available to producers, commercial lenders might be reluctant to provide financing for products and businesses where there is limited financial history. To address this concern, the KADB continues to support the work of the Kentucky Agricultural Finance Corporation.

# Financial Incentives for Environmental Stewardship

Developing environmental awareness in tandem with agricultural diversification is critical to the quality of Kentucky's rural communities. 


The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board has also supported environmental stewardship through the approval of local programs designed to improve farm management techniques for long-term sustainability.

# Priority #5

# **Supporting Local Leadership**

County Agricultural Development Councils and County Extension Agents are catalysts for change that is occurring in Kentucky's agricultural communities. Kentucky Agricultural Development Funds are being used to support this leadership by providing administrative funds for county councils. The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board recognizes the need to continue supporting the leadership efforts of the county agricultural development councils and the Cooperative Extension Service network, while developing programs to encourage local leadership in rural communities.

#### **Priority #6**

### **Research and Development**

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board recognizes the need to maintain strong commitments to applied research in existing farm product areas, as well as the importance of exploring the viability of high-value markets in non-traditional areas. O'Bryan's Grain Farms (photo right) was funded as a research project on a family hog farm in Daviess County. This project may change the way manure is utilized and address a local perception problem with larger production units.

# County Model Programs

ounty Model Programs provide assistance to individual producers through local administrative organizations. They are designed to provide farmers with cost-share funds giving them the opportunity to improve and diversify their current production practices. The following fourteen model programs are offered throughout the Commonwealth.

The Agricultural Diversification Program is designed to improve net farm income through the development and expansion of new agricultural products and new ways of working with existing agricultural commodities.

The Cattle Genetics Improvement Program is designed to increase the genetic quality of beef and dairy cattle in Kentucky through the selection of superior sires, either through purchase/lease of sires or semen.

The **Cattle Handling Facilities Program** is designed to improve and promote best management and health practices that augment efficient production and marketing opportunities.

The **Commercial Poultry Program** is designed to enable farmers involved in poultry production to expand the scope of their enterprise and/or modernize their facilities in order to improve profitability.

The **Dairy Diversification Program** is designed to encourage and assist existing and new dairy producers in renovating and modernizing dairy facilities.

The Farm Livestock Fencing Improvement Program is designed to improve pasture quantity, quality, and efficient use for livestock producers.

The Forage Improvement and Utilization Program is designed to improve forage quality, quantity, and efficient use, as well as, encourage science-based forage management decisions.

The **Goat and Sheep Diversification Program** is designed to assist producers in diversifying into goat and sheep production by promoting animal

health and improving the genetic base of Kentucky's goat and sheep herds.



The **Hay Straw and Commodity Storage Program** is designed to employ best practices related to storage and utilization of feed, hay and straw, thus improving feed and straw quality and animal nutrition.

The **On-Farm Water Enhancement Program** is designed to provide farmers the opportunity to adopt a proactive and systematic approach to expand existing water supplies or to develop alternative water resources.

The **Shared-Use Equipment Program** is designed to impact a high number of producers who cannot justify ownership expenses associated with certain equipment by helping them access technology necessary to improve their operation in an economic manner.

The **Swine Diversification Program** is designed to enable a farmer to begin a swine enterprise and allow producers already engaged in swine production to expand/modernize the scope of their enterprise.

The **Technology Program** is designed to improve farm operation efficiency and assist producers already exploring the use of technology, or wanting to start exploring technology, in their operations.

The Timber Production, Utilization, and Marketing Program is designed to develop new revenue sources for farmers through growing and utilizing existing and new natural resources and to promote timber production and processing in areas not suitable for crop or livestock production.

# Kentucky Agricultural Finance Corporation Executive Summary

he Kentucky Agricultural Finance Corporation strives to make sound long-term investments and improve net farm income by providing Kentucky's farmers and Agribusinesses access to capital that allows them flexibility in financial decisions and leverages their assets to secure affordable loans.

Originally established in 1984, KAFC has evolved with funding from the Kentucky Agricultural Development Board (KADB) to become a source of below market financing to assist individual farmers and agribusinesses seeking to mitigate the risk of developing new enterprises, expand existing operations, and/or implement new technologies. These investments have improved operating efficiencies, enhanced marketing opportunities, and increased net farm income.

Since 2005, KAFC has approved 221 loans for \$23,255,858. To date, KAFC's investments have returned \$1,776,799 in interest with over \$3.8 million in principal being repaid. To date all KAFC loans have paid on a timely basis. As the momentum of the KAFC program continues to build and its loan portfolio grows, servicing KAFC loans will require more staff time and resources.

The 2008 Fiscal Year can best be described as a year of opportunity and transition. Governor Beshear has been supportive of increasing the opportunities for access to capital for Kentucky farmers through KAFC. The change in administration brought the opportunity to review loan programs and develop a comprehensive marketing strategy. Accomplishments include a new KAFC logo with promotional materials and a KAFC e-newsletter directed at agriculture lenders which provides updates on application deadlines, Board meeting dates and program revisions.

A review of KAFC programs and recommendations listed in the Kentucky Agricultural Council (KAC) strategic plan for agriculture resulted in revisions to KAFC loan programs to the benefit of Kentucky farmers accessing the Agricultural Infrastructure Loan Program (AILP) and the Beginning Farmers Loan Program (BFLP). Based on a recommendation of the KAC report, a low interest loan program for veterinarians is being considered along with changes to existing programs. KAFC is exploring a new program to assist individuals licensed to practice veterinary medicine in Kentucky who desire to construct, expand, equip or buy into a practice serving large and food animal producers, including goat, sheep, swine and other smaller food animals.

Although many changes took place in 2008, KAFC will continue to evaluate existing programs and explore new opportunities to improve products and services to Kentucky farmers and agribusinesses. To assist in the evaluation process the KAFC staff and Board of Directors was presented with feedback on KAFC programs, as a result of an in depth study conducted by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture on behalf of the KADB.

This report provided KAFC's board of directors and staff with input to improve operating efficiencies, while maintaining a balanced portfolio with a state-wide distribution that will better serve applicants with limited financial history, new agriculture ventures and diversification efforts.

# Agricultural Infrastructure Loan Program (AILP)

The Kentucky Agricultural Finance Corporation (KAFC) approved a total of \$3,399,624 in loans to 56 borrowers during FY2008, the second year for the program. The AILP is designed to assist Kentucky's farmers in financing long-term projects that will improve their financial viability. These funds can be used to expand, remodel or construct buildings or farm structures for agricultural purposes only. A producer who can document tobacco history may qualify for 2% interest on KAFC loan funds. The loan must be serviced by a participating lending institution. The cap for an AILP loan is \$100,000 or 50% of the project cost.

"The Agricultural Infrastructure Loan Program provided a big savings in our operation," said Dale Denney, owner of Loan Oak Farm, Poultry Operation.

# Agricultural Processing Loan Program (APLP)

The APLP provides loan opportunities to companies that add value to Kentucky-grown agricultural commodities through further processing. Funding opportunities will be made available to entities interested in construction of new facilities and renovation or expansion of existing facilities.

# **Beginning Farmer Loan Program (BFLP)**

The BFLP is designed to assist emerging farmers who wish to create, expand or buy into a farming operation. Loan funds may be used to purchase land, equipment, livestock, facilities, or to buy into an existing partnership or LLC. Loans must be originated and serviced by participating lenders. This program has a limit of \$250,000 or 50% of the outstanding debt held by the participating lender. The KAFC approved 20 BFLP loans totaling \$2,127,803 in FY 2008.

# <u>Coordinated Value-Added Assistance Loan Program</u> (<u>CVAALP</u>)

The CVAALP was created to offer loans to entities in Kentucky that are expanding their operation to provide new contracting opportunities to Kentucky farmers. KAFC will finance loans of up to \$1,000,000 with a limit of \$100,000 for each new grower.

# **Linked Deposit Investment Program (LDIP)**

The LDIP, unlike the other KAFC loan programs that originate from Agricultural Development Funds, is funded through the state's Abandoned and Unclaimed Property Account. Loans from this program must be made by an eligible depository lender. Approved borrowers may receive loans fixed at prime with terms of up to seven years. The KAFC has been informed that funding for new Linked Deposit Loans may not be readily available. This limitation of funds does not affect current Linked Deposit borrowers, nor does it affect applicants or borrowers in any of the other KAFC loan programs.
